

Dear fellow Prairieville resident,

Please allow me to welcome you to this report on some of the outreaches we undertake and upgrades we make in our continual effort to keep you and your family safe.

2020 marks 50 years since the PFD was founded by civic-minded individuals who saw a need and worked tirelessly to fill it. The organization was totally volunteer back in 1970 and remained so for many years. We now provide five, fully-staffed stations manned by 45 professional firefighters and emergency medical responders who are available 24/7/365.

Speaking of improvements, a 3,000-square-foot expansion to our main office on Highway 73 is complete. The new space will be used in many ways, including hosting more training programs and housing personnel should our community need support in a disaster. As always, you are welcome to stop by and have a look for yourself. Call if you'd like to arrange a tour of any of our stations for your group.

As COVID-19 continues to be a concern for our community, state and nation, we have instituted special procedures when responding to your call for help. We will continue to do all we can to limit the spread of the virus while rendering assistance in a medical or fire emergency.

Teaching fire safety remains a top priority and we keep working to educate and protect the 40,000 or so residents and 35 square miles of Prairieville from residential and commercial fire incidents. Medical emergencies continue to be a large portion of our calls and we are strengthening training for our people, helping them achieve advanced certifications that will allow them to do even more to help you in these situations.

In any emergency, do not hesitate to call 911 and please let me know if I or this department can ever be of service to you.

50 Years of Service

In 1969, after St. John Catholic Church was destroyed by a blaze, local civic leaders realized the need for fire protection. The Prairieville Volunteer Fire Department was formed and chartered by the state in 1970. As people say, the rest is history.

As years passed, the all-volunteer department got larger and kept up with calls for assistance. But, Prairieville was growing fast. Additional equipment and consistent funding was needed to provide sufficient fire protection.

In early 2005, some of the founding members began a grassroots campaign seeking dedicated tax millages to fund the department. A special taxing district for the Prairieville area was created and Ascension Parish Fire District #3 was born. Voters recently renewed this funding source.

From one truck and a barn to five modern fire stations staffed around-the-clock by professional firefighters and emergency medical personnel who save lives, the PFD has come a long way. The same spirit of supporting and keeping our community safe that began five decades ago continues today.

Here's to the next 50 years!

Working Together

The PFD routinely trains with numerous other departments, such as St. George from Baton Rouge. Mutual aid agreements with other agencies ensure cooperation to keep you safe.

Night Training

Because not all emergencies occur during daylight, we routinely train at night. Our burn building at the main office on Highway 73 often serves as a hub for these activities.

COVID-19 Care

Emergency responders have been rightfully recognized for continuing to do their jobs in the face of COVID-19. PFD continues to take extra precautions including employing more personal protection equipment to shield the people and family members of those we are called to help. When you ask for assistance, we will continue to make house calls.



New Equipment on the Way

As part of our continuing efforts to provide you with the best service possible, the PFD is in the process of acquiring two new fire engines to replace 2001 and 2007 models currently in service. The National Fire Protection Association recommends a 15 year lifespan for an engine.

The cost of a new, custom-built, highly-specialized engine is about \$450,000. "New engines will be more reliable and require less costly maintenance, saving our department money," Chief Stewart said.

The Numbers

We respond as quickly as possible to your call for help. Besides fire and medical emergencies, we also respond to motor vehicle accidents, hazardous material incidents and construction site mishaps. In any emergency, dial 911.

Kitchen Fire Prevention

Kitchen fires are one of the leading causes of fire deaths in Louisiana and nearly half of all home fires start there when food or cooking materials such as utensils, potholders, kitchen towels or clothing ignite.

- Stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are cooking something for a long time, check it often and use a timer as a reminder.
- Have an oven mitt and pan lid nearby. If a grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame and turn off the burner.
- Keep children away from the cooking area.
